We basically surrounded the vehicle on the street about a felony traffic stop, removed all the people out of the car at gun point, and placed them into custody.”

7. Despite AG Investigator Clyman’s claim of misdemeanor warrants regarding restraining orders, AG Investigator Clyman revised his testimony to a “felony traffic stop.”
8. Mr. Gartin was, in fact, arrested on September 19, 2000, on erroneous grounds stemming from 97 M 811, and charged in 00 CR 2419.
9. The misdemeanor warrants arose from combined case numbers 97 M 811 and 97 M 812, which cases were dismissed on October 2, 1997, three years before the S.W.A.T. team arrest. (Exhibit B is attached hereto and incorporated herein).
10. Unfortunately, the Honorable Charles T. Hoppin, who had recused himself in 97 M 811 and 97 M 812 due to a conflict of interest, signed the warrant for Mr. Gartin’s arrest in 00 CR 2419 while still under a disability of acting as a fair and impartial jurist. (See Exhibit B).
11. Upon bonding himself out of jail on the misdemeanor warrants, Mr. Gartin advised AG Investigator Clyman on October 10, 2000, of errors in the arrest through a Petition for Redress of Grievances.
12. AG Investigator Clyman responded to Mr. Gartin in correspondence dated October 18, 2000, and denied Mr. Gartin’s claims in the Petition for Redress of Grievances. (Exhibit C is attached hereto and incorporated herein).
13. This correspondence of AG Investigator Clyman came only five days before his damning Testimony before the Grand Jury.
14. A grand jury indictment naming Mr. Gartin on the underlying charges in 00 CR 3371, which stemmed from the erroneous filing in 00 CR 2419, was issued on December 18, 2000.
15. Having bonded out of jail months earlier and having been released from custody, and more importantly, while not having been served with the indictment in 00 CR 3371 and therefore unaware of its issuance, Mr. Gartin moved from Colorado to Marin County, California.
16. On March 13, 2001, Mr. Gartin was arrested while on his way to teach a children’s martial arts class by FBI agents in another S.W.A.T. team arrest based upon a Federal Warrant issued for Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution in the erroneous filing in 00 CR 2419. (Exhibit D is attached hereto and incorporated herein).
17. Mr. Gartin was then held in solitary confinement for seven (7) days in California.
18. The charge of Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution was then dismissed.
19. Nevertheless, police officials continued to hold Mr. Gartin in custody and he was returned to Colorado by agents of the Jefferson County Sheriff’s Office on April 4, 2001.
20. On April 30, 2000, charges in 00 CR 2419 were dismissed.
21. Mr. Gartin remained in custody at the Jefferson County Jail until a negotiated plea was entered in 00 CR 3371.
22. On April 8, 2002, Mr. Gartin pleaded guilty to a felony charge of Extortion on Count I and a misdemeanor charge of Filing a False Instrument on Count II in 00 CR 3711.
23. On Count I, Mr. Gartin was sentenced to two years deferred judgment.
24. On Count II Mr. Gartin was sentenced to time served.
25. Mr. Gartin was also ordered to attend anger management, and to provide urinalysis for one year, and to pay \$4000 in restitution.
26. Mr. Gartin completed anger management and provided urinalysis as ordered.
